CEF Sponsors Top 10% Celebration

On May 17, 2024, Chatham County Schools held an "Evening of Academic Excellence," celebrating the top 10% of seniors from each of CCS' high schools. The Chatham Education Foundation sponsored the event which kicked off with light refreshments and a serenade from Seaforth High School's jazz band, under the direction of the band's director Mr. Keith Gilbert. "In today's climate, it's important to celebrate the success of our public school students," said Brittany Sandefur, CEF's executive director. "I wish everyone in Chatham could come see these kids—what they've accomplished in their years in school, and their aspirations for what comes next. It's inspiring." The funds are being used to train new teachers so that more students can have access to the program; cover tutoring costs; and purchase curriculum materials and supplies.

AVID, which stands for Advancement Via Individual Determination, is a nationally recognized college and career readiness program that CCS Superintendent Dr. Anthony Jackson proclaims **"disrupts the predictability of who succeeds and who fails."**

JayLynn Bostic, a Northwood High School graduate, calls the AVID program the backbone of her success. "I would not be where I am today – headed to UNC Charlotte – without the program," she said.

AVID students learn organizational skills, focused note-taking, and how to collaborate. They also visit colleges and get help with the college application process. The results speak for themselves:

100% of CCS AVID graduates are accepted to a 4-year college, and in 2024, JayLynn and her fellow AVID graduates obtained more than \$18 million in scholarship offers.

CCS would like to see AVID expanded to all students in all schools, as research shows that when additional students have access to AVID resources and strategies, the more likely they are to continue on to earn a college degree or high-quality credential. CEF knows this is an attainable goal and will continue to fundraise until it comes to fruition.

BOOKS ON BREAK

Since 2016, the Chatham Education Foundation has hosted free book fairs called Books on Break at Chatham County schools in low-income communities. That first year, CEF gave away nearly 5,400 books to students at two elementary schools. This year, CEF gave away 14,000 books to 2,670 students at seven schools and one neighborhood.

The neighborhood-called the Nature Trail-is an underserved residential community in which close to 100% of families qualify for free or reduced lunch. The students in the neighborhood attend North Chatham Elementary, but as the majority of students at NCE do not qualify for free or reduced lunch, CEF brought the program directly to the students living in this neighborhood.

Through Chatham Reads, CEF also distributed close to 7,000 gently-used books through our community partners including CORA, the Boys & Girls Club, Partnership for Children, and the Chatham County Youth Development Center, as well as eight minilending libraries around Chatham County. CEF is thankful for all of those who held book drives including Briar Chapel, The Preserve,

Seaforth High School, Northwood High School, 501 Pharmacy and For Garden's Sake. We are also thankful for our 118 volunteers who helped out at our Books on Break events and collected, sorted, inventoried, and distributed thousands of books.

"If the shelves are a mess, that's a good thing..."

...said Sheila Creth, a volunteer who keeps the CORA food pantry bookshelves stocked with gently-used books collected by the Chatham Education Foundation. "That means the kids are looking through the books." In 2023, CEF began a partnership with CORA to provide books for children whose families

visit the pantry. At each visit, each child may select one book to take home.

This initiative began with Shelia who had heard of a similar way of getting books into kids' hands in New York where she lived previously. "Kids deserve books," Sheila said, "but sometimes you have to bring the books to where they are, especially if they live in rural places and don't have easy access to libraries." Sheila knew CORA was the perfect place to have books available, but it took her a while to find the books. She finally had her "aha moment" while reading Fearrington Village's neighborhood newsletter and learned about McIntyre's Books and their work with Chatham Reads. When she called Kathy Havens, Chatham Reads program manager at CEF, to suggest the partnership, Sheila was rewarded with, "You made my day!" It didn't take long to get the program up and running as Chatham Reads always has books on hand. Now every couple of weeks, Sheila visits the pantry to organize and restock the books, ensuring that there are some for every age. She's also training new volunteers to help keep the bookshelves stocked.

McIntyre's Books Earns Inaugural CEF Champion Award



In May, at our Invest in Our Future event, the Chatham Education Foundation presented its first inaugural Champion Award to the staff at McIntyre's Books who have been ardent supporters of CEF and Chatham Reads. Over the years a few things they have done to promote our Books on Break program include creating store displays encouraging customers to purchase and donate books and creating an online wishlist with a 20% discount for any donor purchasing a book.
